Are you seeing any natural enemies?

While it is always recommended to monitor for potato pests, it is also good to remember that many of the insects in potato fields are beneficial. Have you seen some of these insects in your fields? If so, that's good news for you!

Big-eyed bug

- Eats many potato pests
- Easily identified by the big, red eyes
- Likes to eat aphids

Damsel bug

- Eats many potato pests
- Front legs resemble those of a praying mantis
- Large predator
- Likes to eat aphids, but also eats CPB larvae

Minute Pirate bug

- Eats many potato pests
- Extremely tiny
- Black and white pattern resembles pirate flag
- A good predator of psyllids

Lacewings

- Eats many potato pests
- Large green or brown insects
- Larvae are good predators of aphids and psyllids
- Eggs are on long stalks

HAREC Plant Pathology Lab Potato Disease Update 6/21/13

No late blight has been reported in the basin yet. Due to the recent weather growers should be scouting fields and tracking the 10 day forecast so they can plan fungicide applications prior to heavy precipitation.
