Proposed Changes to Ag Water Requirements

On December 2nd, the FDA published a proposed rule that would revise subpart E of the FDA FSMA Produce Safety Rule to change certain preharvest agricultural water requirements for covered produce other than sprouts. Under this proposal, farms would be required to conduct annual systems-based agricultural water assessments to determine and guide appropriate measures to minimize potential risks associated with preharvest agricultural water. The assessment would include an evaluation of the water system, agricultural water use practices, crop characteristics, environmental conditions, potential impacts on source water by activities conducted on adjacent and nearby land, and other relevant factors, such as the results of optional testing. 
Stakeholder Meetings on Proposed Changes to Agricultural Water Requirements

Webinar Series: Part II - Food Safety for Organic Food Processors

The CCOF Foundation in collaboration with the Washington State Department of Agriculture Organic program, Washington State University, UC Davis Food Science and Technology, and University of California Agriculture and Natural Resources are providing a part two to their food safety for organic food processors webinar series. Recently passed federal regulations require food processors to meet certain food safety standards. In part one of this series, organizers walked through the different compliance categories of the federal Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA) for food processors. In part two of the series, speakers will dive deeper into food safety topics such as hazard analysis, validation, and cottage food laws. Due to popular request by organic businesses that both grow and process produce, we also included two webinars that review the FSMA Produce Safety Rule as it applies to organic produce farms.

- Evaluation should track participation, outputs, knowledge gain, practice change, and success stories. Templates are available for recording/reporting this information.



1) Produce Safety Alliance: Southwest Regional Extension Associate

The Produce Safety Alliance (PSA), is a collaborative project with the USDA and the FDA to provide educational outreach assistance to fresh produce growers and packers, including grower cooperatives, to increase their understanding of the critical role they play in public health by implementing food safety practices on the farm and in packinghouses.

As a key member of the PSA team, the Southwest Regional Extension

Associate (REA) will be responsible for planning, organizing, instructing, and evaluating PSA training programs for produce growers, extension educators, and regulatory personnel in their region. Due to extensive national and international collaboration established by the PSA, it is anticipated the SW REA will interact with a diverse population of individuals and groups with specific emphasis in the Southwest including, but not limited to, State Departments of Agriculture personnel, commodity groups, Land-Grant University personnel, and the Western Regional Center to Enhance Food Safety (WRCEFS) collaborators.
